

Plenary speakers & discussants at the Dutch co-conference on research integration & implementation

Prof. Edwin Bakker is professor Terrorism at Leiden University and Director of the Centre for Terrorism and Counterterrorism (CTC) in The Hague. His research topics include radicalization and jihadist terrorism in general and profiles of jihadist terrorists in particular. In addition, his research focuses on the handling of fear of terrorism and policy implications in this area.

Prof. Gabriele Bammer is Director of the Research School of Population Health, of the National Centre for Epidemiology and Population Health and of the Australian Primary Health Care Research Institute, all in the ANU College of Medicine, Biology and Environment, The Australian National University. She is developing the new discipline of Integration and Implementation Sciences and is chair of the First Global Conference on Research Integration and Implementation.

Dr. Thieu Besselink is researcher, writer, and social entrepreneur. He wrote his multidisciplinary PhD with prof. Richard Sennett and prof. Neil Walker at the European University Institute, LSE, and NYU on authority and leadership in the open society. He also studied at the theater academy in Florence, piano and music technology at the conservatory, political philosophy at Bologna University, and took an MSc in philosophy and urban studies at London School of Economics. Thieu is founder and designer of The learning lab. The Learning Lab participates in curriculum development, program design and system learning processes with a.o. FreedomLab, Guggenheim, Utrecht University, BMW, MIT and others.

Prof. dr. Jacqueline Broerse is professor of innovation and communication in the health and life sciences at the Athena Institute, VU University in Amsterdam. She holds a master's in Biomedical Sciences. Her research is focused on methodology development for realizing a science-society dialogue in new and emerging innovations in the health and life sciences. She has been involved as advisor and facilitator in interactive policy-making trajectories of the Dutch Ministry of Health, Welfare and Sports.

Dr. Dorette Corbey is the President of the Committee for Sustainability Issues and Biomass (CDB), Chairman of the board of the Dutch Emissions Authority and director of the Advisory Council for Science and Technology and the Energy Council. She was a member of the Royal Dutch Academy of Science Committee that recently issued an advice *Trust in Science*. From 1999 till 2009, she was MEP for the Labour Party.

Prof. Josee van Eijndhoven holds the chair in Sustainability Management at the Dutch Research Institute for Transitions (DRIFT). She is a member of the Academy for Technology and Innovation. a member of the Council for Science, Technology and Society at KIVI-NIRIA, the Dutch association of engineers and a member of the Netherlands National Commission for UNESCO. Formerly, she was president of Erasmus University Rotterdam and director of the Rathenau Institute for Technology Assessment.

Prof. dr. Richard Griffiths is Professor of Social and Economic History at Leiden University. He graduated in Economic History and Russian Studies at the University College of Swansea and obtained his PhD in history from the University of Cambridge. He coordinates the Art Faculty's

Praktijkstudies program and, within that framework, its European Union Studies courses. He also lectures regularly on MA courses at Bilgi University (Istanbul) and Chulalongkorn University (Bangkok).

Prof. Thea Hilhorst is a rural development sociologist specialized in natural disasters, conflict and humanitarian aid in relation to development at Wageningen University. She has a focus on organizational processes and recently published *The Real World of NGOs; Discourses, Diversity and Development* with Zed Books.

Prof. Cees Leeuwis is professor of Knowledge, Technology and Innovation at Wageningen University. He focuses on approaches to developing effective socio-technical innovations in networks, collaboration between different disciplines, integration and use of scientific and other knowledge, the functioning of innovation support systems and the role of research, extension and brokers therein.

Prof. Frank Miedema is professor of Immunology at UMC Utrecht and is involved since 1983 in research on HIV pathogenesis. Since January 2009 he is dean and vice-chairman of the Executive Board of UMC Utrecht. He recently published *Science 3.0. Real Science, Real Knowledge* arguing that the romantic view of science acting as altruistic truth seekers does not hold and that we need to revision the way we prioritize research topics reflecting better our collective values.

Dr. Esther Turnhout is associate professor at the department of Forest and Nature Conservation Policy at Wageningen University and Research Centre. Her research and teaching concern the relations between science and non-science in the fields of nature conservation, biodiversity, natural resource management and environmental governance. She has published on topics such as the science policy interface, classification and standardization, boundary work, and public participation.

Prof. Roel in 't Veld is emeritus Professor in Public Administration. From 1996 to 2009 he was chair of the RMNO, The Advisory Council for Research on Spatial Planning, Nature and the Environment. Since November 2010, he is professor at the University of Tilburg in 'Governance and sustainability'. His special focus is on developments in parliamentary and other democratic processes. He is the editor of *Knowledge Democracy. Consequences for Science, Politics, and Media*.

Prof. Joris Voorhoeve is Professor in Public Administration at Campus The Hague, Leiden University. His field is in particular international organizations. His expertise is in foreign affairs, political science and international relations and organizations. Besides this, he is also chairman of the supervisory board of Oxfam Novib and director of SEN Foundation. In the nineties he was minister of Defense and in the late eighties leader of the VVD.

Prof. dr. Jouke de Vries is the Dean of Leiden University Campus The Hague. It's a faculty of Leiden University with an interdisciplinary character. Academic Entrepreneurship and Academic teaching and research are guiding principles of the Campus. Jouke de Vries carries out research on decision-making processes, policy changes and issues of political-governmental management. One of his additional position is vice chairman of the Board Foundation Montesquieu Institute. He is also chairman of Thorbeckevereniging, an association for democratic governance and representation.
