In this i2S News we highlight three i2Insights contributions about modelling. i2Insights provides discussions about aspects of modelling that can help modellers and non-modellers work together or that are useful for non-modellers in interpreting models, and these three contributions all advance thinking in these areas.

In i2S-Talks, this i2S News features another stand-out seminar from the NITRO-Oceania (Network of Interdisciplinary and Transdisciplinary Research Organisations in the Oceania region) seminar series. This one is by Professor Alex Haslam and tackles the important issue of effective leadership, which can easily be translated to leadership of interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary projects, programs and research organisations.

Highlighting recent contributions about modelling

Modelling is an important tool for research integration and implementation. It involves specialised expertise, which is beyond the scope of i2Insights. Instead, i2Insights focuses on more general aspects of modelling, especially those that can help modellers and non-modellers work together or that are useful for non-modellers in interpreting models. Three i2Insights contributions are highlighted.

First is Andrea Saltelli's "[Five lessons to improve how models serve society](#)" which are:

1. Mind the assumptions, by considering the accuracy and credibility of model outputs
2. Mind the hubris, by looking for optimum trade-offs between complexity and error
3. Mind the framing, where transparency supports communication and enhances trust
4. Mind the consequences, by ensuring that quantification does not project a false sense of certainty
5. Mind the unknowns, but avoiding excess precision which can limit policy options and open the door to unintended consequences.

Models are also improved when they include a wide range of perspectives, which is the aim of participatory modelling and facilitated modelling. It is not yet clear if these are different names for the same practice or different practices, and i2Insights aims to promote discussion on this issue. Sondoss Elawah, Elena Bakhanova, Raimo Hämmäläinen and Alexey Voinov explore [five core competency areas for participatory modeling](#). As well as core competencies in systems thinking and modelling, expertise is also required in group facilitation; project management and leadership; and operating in the virtual space.

Vincent de Gooyert takes a more fine-grained approach to [improving facilitated modelling](#), especially achieving cognitive change and forming consensus. He considers lessons from what can go wrong in facilitated modelling, as well as hypotheses to be tested, such as whether workshops should avoid having dual aims of team building and analytical consideration of the issue of concern, especially as in team building there is a tendency to avoid uncomfortable discussions which stops sensitive issues from being raised.

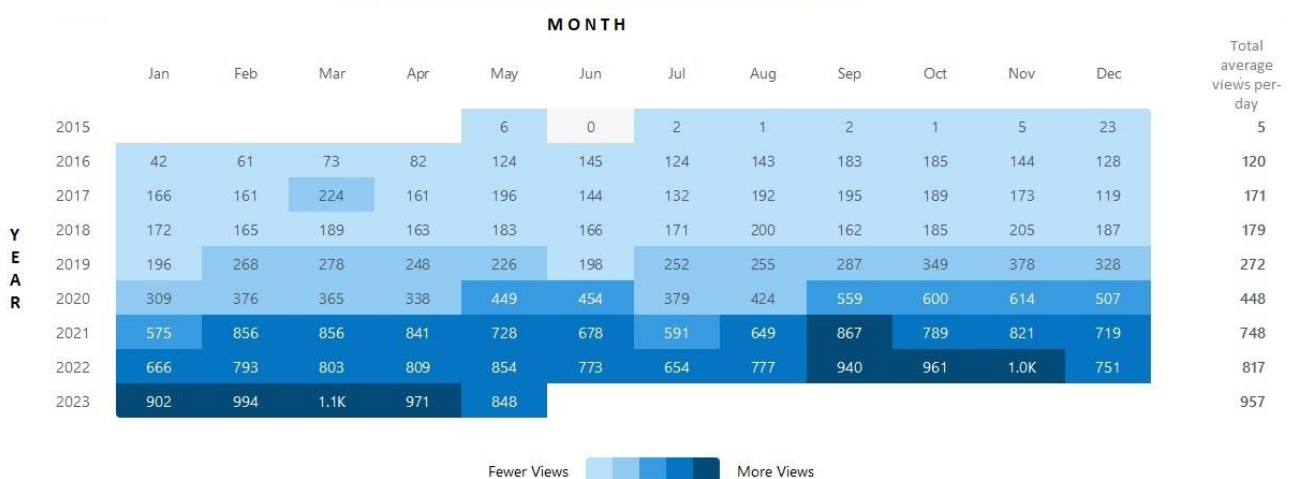
Highlights from i2Insights statistics

i2S-TALKS

Highlighting effective leadership for interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary projects, programs and research organisations

Professor Alex Haslam proposes that effective leadership is grounded in leaders' capacity to embody and promote a sense of social identity that they share with others—a process of identity leadership. He argues that leadership is the product not of 'I-ness' but of 'we-ness' that binds leaders and followers together.

This perspective sees leadership, motivation and influence not as processes that revolve around individuals acting and thinking in isolation, but as group processes in which leaders and followers are joined together—and perceive themselves to be joined together—in shared endeavour. But in order for this to succeed, leaders need to represent and champion the group and they also need to create and embed a sense of shared identity.

The seminar provided evidence of these processes in action and established the basis for a discussion about the implications for leadership of interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary projects, programs and research organisations.

The seminar by Professor Alex Haslam, Professor of Social and Organizational Psychology and Australian Laureate Fellow at the University of Queensland in Brisbane, Australia, on "Effective organisational leadership and what it means for interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary research organisations" was presented on December 2, 2021 as part of the NITRO-Oceania (Network of Interdisciplinary and Transdisciplinary Research Organisations in the Oceania region) seminar series.
