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#### **i2INSIGHTS BLOG AND REPOSITORY**

#### Highlighting contributions from Latin America and the Caribbean

In actively encouraging contributions from all countries for i2Insights blog and repository, we have been pleased to receive a reasonably steady stream of posts where all or some of the authors reside in Latin America and the Caribbean. There were 5 such contributions in 2016, 4 in each of 2017 and 2020, 3 in 2021 and 2023, 2 in 2022 and 1 in 2018. Only 2019 saw no contributions from authors in this region.

There have been 10 lead authors from Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, Costa Rica, Peru and Uruguay, along with 18 co-authors from Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Mexico and Trinidad and Tobago. In these statistics, contributors are only counted once, even though some have contributed multiple times, as can be seen from the list of blog posts below. It has also been great to have Spanish and/or Portuguese versions of many blog posts, along with English.

### Highlights from i2Insights statistics

In reviewing how well i2Insights is progressing, we regularly examine the country of residence of authors and include this in the <u>statistics we publish</u>. For this i2S News we also looked at these statistics according to 7 regions, as shown in the table below. The figures are to end March 2024.

Region	Lead author	Co-author
Europe and UK	126	125
North America	98	78
Oceania	73	72
Latin America and the Caribbean	10	18
Middle East and North Africa	9	2
Asia	8	8
Sub-Saharan Africa	7	28

Grouping authors by region shows that:

- Europe and the UK has the largest number of authors, with 20 countries represented (UK, Switzerland, Germany, Netherlands, Sweden, Austria, Norway, Portugal, Finland, Spain, France, Belgium, Italy, Denmark, Czech Republic, Ireland, Luxembourg, Russia, Türkiye, Poland).
- North America, comprising the USA and Canada, has the second largest number of authors.
- Oceania is third, although only two countries (Australia and New Zealand) are represented.
- Latin America and the Caribbean come next and are represented by 10 countries (Brazil, Uruguay, Colombia, Argentina, Costa Rica, Peru, Bolivia, Mexico, Trinidad and Tobago, and Chile). The information from these countries is described in more detail earlier in i2S News.
- The Middle East and North Africa are represented by 4 countries (Iran, Egypt, Israel, and Oman).
- Asian authors come from 7 countries (Japan, China, India, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Laos and Myanmar).
- Sub-Saharan Africa authors come from nine countries (South Africa, Nigeria, Ethiopia, Benin, Rwanda, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ghana, Kenya, Senegal).

In these descriptions countries are listed in descending order of number of contributors.

Each contributor is counted only once, even if they authored and/or co-authored more than one blog post. If a contributor is a first author and a co-author on different blog posts, they are counted only as a first author. If an author is affiliated with more than one country over time, the country of residence at the time of first publishing in i2Insights is counted. If an author is affiliated with more than one country at the time of first publishing, the country in which they are primarily resident is counted.
